Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club continues to fulfill its mission. We stayed strong for our Bronx families during the height of the pandemic and are now focused on Building a Brighter Future. COVID had serious consequences for the physical health of many and the secondary effects remain. Mental and emotional health issues have come to the forefront. Lack of socialization and daily activities have challenged those who experienced isolation. Thankfully, Kips Bay has stayed present, adaptable, and ready to continue to create connections and to support our members and their families.

As we transitioned from virtual programming and distanced-learning, we reintroduced in-person interactions while continuing to emphasize health and safety protocols. Our members were excited to be back, and our numbers keep increasing. We are slowly getting back to normal.

Activities were in motion during 2021. While we continued with Learning Labs to provide academic support for our members, many of our traditional programs and activities were reinstated: the aquatics program, social recreation program, basketball, etc.

In response to significant issues that arose during the pandemic ranging from gun violence to obesity, Kips Bay has remained in the forefront. We partnered with the NYC Mayor's Action Plan for Neighborhood Safety (MAPS) and provided youth ages 14 to 24 with anti-gun violence programming including community service, job readiness and civic engagement.

We are also extremely proud to announce the completion of our Culinary Learning Center. Bronx communities are facing a crisis of obesity, diabetes, and heart disease. To combat this health crisis, we are teaching our youngsters about healthy nutritional practices. This space will be utilized to learn culinary skills, and how to shop for and prepare healthy food. It will also offer valuable career-readiness services for members interested in becoming professional chefs or entering the catering business.

As we assess where we are today and the growing needs of this organization, we continue to stay focused on Building a Brighter Future. In 2023, we will begin the most dramatic renovation initiative in the history of the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club at our flagship location, the Lucile Palmaro Clubhouse.

Younger members are an ever-increasing population, and we are committed to providing the services they need and deserve. With this expansion and renovation, we will do that and more. Most importantly, we will continue to work hard to achieve it all.

Thank you as always for your investment in our organization. With your continued support we can all look forward to Building a Brighter Future for our members and communities.

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Social Recreation

When a visitor first walks into Kips Bay, the first thing they see is the massive game room, the heartbeat of the Club. It's in this room that Club members ages 6-18 develop body (exercise), mind (academics) and soul (social skills) in the Social Recreation program.

And if the visitor is lucky, the first person they'll meet is Valerie Reyes, Social Recreation Director. Valerie has been on staff for 25 years. "I don't want children to enter my space and just have access to the equipment. I'm a big fan of team building," she said.

"If a member doesn't want to play, you can still give them a sense of belonging.

You might ask, "Do you want to keep score? Do you want to give out equipment?" Our members feel safe in our space, and they know this is their Club. We want each of them to have the best experience possible on a daily basis."

Kips Bay's game room and the people who work here are part of the journey Club members enjoy. Parents go to work knowing their kids are not only safe, but playing, learning, and growing.

Valerie tears up when she recalls members who grew up, moved away and then come back to see her. "We see kids come in at age six and move on at 18. The icing on the cake is when they come by to visit and ask for me," she said.

"Anthony came to Kips Bay as a youngster. He played basketball and participated in other activities and he flourished. Recently, I received a call from the front desk: Ms. Valerie, you have a visitor. I was surprised to see Anthony. When I looked into Anthony's eyes, I noticed his transformation. He said, 'I wanted to stop by to thank you. I know I gave you a hard time, but I'm glad you were hard on me, too. If it wasn't for you and for everyone else at Kips Bay, I could have been lost right now.'"

"When I hear that, I know we must be doing something right," Valerie said.

Putting their Best Foot Forward



In 2021, Kips Bay's performing arts program expanded to go even further to meet the needs of members who are interested in the arts for fun, and also as possible careers.

Members do not have to dance and sing to be in the arts. They can create costumes, choreograph dance numbers, design stage lighting, or handle any number of backstage activities. For members who do want to perform, there are a variety of classes, including ballet, salsa, African, hip-hop, modern, and commercial dance. "We also show them how to film themselves dancing, because that's an important aspect of the arts today," said Anthony Rodriguez, who took over leadership of the performing arts program in 2021.

"The arts help kids in incredible ways," he continued. "In a short time span, our current

group increased their levels of confidence in their dance abilities and as human beings. Even if they don't want to pursue the arts, the amazing team-building skills and self-esteem they acquire can easily be applied to other career opportunities."

Everyone gets a chance to dance, with fun and structured dance. Some members want to sing, so Anthony expanded the program to include voice classes. Recently, the students have been given opportunities to perform at other venues and experience how it feels to prepare for and give a formal performance. By serving members ages 6-18, performing arts at Kips Bay can lead to enjoyment and relationship building – and even to broadening high school, college, and career options. Today's dancers and singers at Kips Bay just might follow in Anthony's footsteps.

Meet Our New Director

When Anthony Rodriguez joined Kips Bay as director of the performing arts program in October, it was far from his first visit to the Club. That happened when he was eight years old, when he walked through Kips Bay's doors for the first time and was inspired to study dance here.

Anthony then went off to attend Ballet Hispánico and graduate from LaGuardia High School for the Performing Arts and before long, he was on tour dancing with Madonna, Tito Puente, Cyndi Lauper, and Prince.

Now he's back leading the performing arts program. "The arts program here was always strong," he said. "My goal is to expand it to the point where young people can aspire to be more than a superstar; to encourage the artistic mentality in other ways."



Building Confidence and Team Spirit In and Out of the Water

Kips Bay's Aquatics Program may start out as a fun dip in the pool for many Club members, but it often ends up turning into much more. "There's a progression," explained Eddie Oyola, Aquatic Director. "For many, they achieve being able to swim in the deep end, so they join our learn-to-swim program. Then they join the swim team. Then they come in for their lifeguard certificate. That can get expensive, so we try to keep the cost down. And once they have their certificate, they can make real money over the summer, life-changing money." And it all started with a dip in the Kips Bay pool.

Eddie, who grew up in a Club, then swam in one and got his first job in one, has been at Kips Bay for eight years. "My greatest passion is providing these youngsters the exposure to experiences outside the neighborhood through aquatics," he said. Through swimming, they learn responsibility and how to be prepared for life beyond the pool. Eddie recommends his students for jobs and the employers still call him to say, "send me more!"

We often hosts youngsters from other groups in the community. The more locals who come to visit, the more useful Kips Bay can be to our neighbors.

Some Kips Bay swimmers go on to join the military. When they come back to visit Eddie, they thank him for all he taught them. "They say because of swimming here, they're better prepared than most people for the discipline necessary for a career in the military."

Parents who might be fearful of the water often end up with kids who come to swim even more often than they're scheduled to. Former swimmers are now bringing their own kids so they can have the same experience. "It means they trust us," Eddie said.

A Safe Space for Emotional Expression

Members love to develop and show others their artistic side in our Creative Arts program, which includes traditional art projects like drawing, painting, and ceramics, and also the special skills needed to be creative in the digital arts.

Students take pencil, pen, and crayon to paper, paint to canvas, and clay to pottery wheel to express themselves creatively.

Our digital recording studio also offers young people an opportunity to learn and

practice how to express themselves by using their talents and skills to play and record their own audio and video. First, they work on an Apple computer with keyboard and drum pads to create their own beats and write their own lyrics. Then they go to the recording studio to record their work. Finally, they use greenscreen technology to add video. Once they're done, their final product is posted on our digital arts YouTube page, where it lives forever for all to see and enjoy.



We're Cooking up Life-Long Skills

Teaching members about eating well is important to their physical and mental development. Many of our families live in nutritionally underserved neighborhoods — food deserts — making it especially challenging for them to make healthy choices. The best options might be more expensive, and cheaper options are plentiful at both fast food restaurants and in local grocery stores. When our members know how to prepare and eat a rainbow of fruits and vegetables, they actually enjoy eating well, and are more likely to choose wisely.

We're excited to partner with Wellness in the Schools, which provides our members with full culinary training for youth, with an emphasis on vegetarian eating habits. The program is on site two days a week, serving about 150 youngsters and hoping to reach 500 year round, teaching them the basics of healthy and delicious food preparation in our new Culinary Learning Center.




Keeping Kids in School During COVID

A productive space to continue studies

When an emergency hits our community, we mobilize quickly and do what we can to help. When COVID hit our City so abruptly, requiring schools to shut down in whole or in part, we knew we needed to keep our kids learning in an environment where their parents knew they would be both protected and productive.

Kips Bay opened Learning Labs, a quiet and productive place for kids to continue their studies when their school buildings weren't available. We took in students from neighboring schools to ensure they had a safe place to learn, either in person or remotely, where they received instruction from their own teachers and schools. This ensured that, as much as possible, their classwork could continue according to their assigned curriculums. It meant they wouldn't have to fall behind.

Kips Bay partnered with the New York City Department of Education and the Department of Youth and Community Development to make sure students had the resources they needed, including



computers or tablets for access to their teachers online. When the City was in upheaval, we gave families the stability and peace of mind of having a safe and familiar place for their kids to go, giving them a sense of security during trying times.

Until schools were able to open again full time, we were there for families — when parents were required to go back to work, Kips Bay ensured their kids a safe haven to come to during regular school hours.



Helping Students Reach for the Stars

The Kips Bay Scholars Program helps members achieve their dreams by helping to fund their educations. To be eligible, students must be a Kips Bay member and maintain at least a B average. They must also be recommended by a current Kips Bay staff member and must demonstrate financial need. Once accepted, recipients must give back to the community by performing 25 hours of community service every year. Students can apply for elementary school through college and can apply for renewal year after year. Currently, about 65 students participate, with about 20 new additions each year.

Keeping Youth Safe and Productive

Kips Bay joined with the New York City Mayor's Office to provide youth ages 14-24 with a variety of safe and productive activities to keep them away from the guns and violence to which they might otherwise be drawn. Approximately 100 students participated in the program in 2021. Teens were offered a varied curriculum, including civic engagement and work readiness opportunities.

Youngsters 16-24 years old were provided opportunities to work — and get paid — 15

hours/week serving as junior camp counselors or as staff engaging with younger kids, helping with homework, working the coatroom, or helping out in the gym. For many of these young people, it was their first paid job experience. The program also introduced them to necessary work-related skills including applying for and activating a bank account with direct deposit and a debit card, learning what a pay cycle is and knowing firsthand the responsibility of having and keeping a job. They will now be more capable to seek out and succeed in future job opportunities.

For 14-16 year old participants, the program offered a daily 45-minute structured curriculum, including Teen Talk, Drama, Cooking, Pathway to Manhood, Smart Girls and Fun Fridays. These younger teens also participated in Brent's Club, a substance abuse prevention and education program.





Balfour A. was about nine years old when he first walked into Kips Bay. "I wasn't into sports until Kips Bay turned me into a sports fanatic.

When I joined the summer camp, I fell in love with the gym and sports, especially basketball. Then I started coming to the afterschool program," he said.

Darril Almonte, now an athletics director at the Kips Bay Lucile Palmaro site, said, "Balfour has a positive attitude; anything we need in the Clubhouse, he's there for us."

Balfour, a junior at SUNY Oswego in the 2021-22 school year, is majoring in business administration and minoring in communications. Why does he keep coming back to Kips Bay? "They've done so much for me that I just want to give back every time I return to New York."

Sofia S. isn't only building a better future for herself at Kips Bay, she's also helping to build a better future for the next generation of Kips Bay kids.

Sofia first joined our Summer Youth Employment program in 2018 as a 15-year-old. By 19, she was a summer camp counselor for nineteen very active five year olds.

The key was to start the day with enthusiasm to match the energy that the kids bring every morning. "I'm their number one supporter. If they have a great idea, I'll get excited for them and we'll do it. When I was growing up, my third grade teacher did that for me. It's more than just playtime. I make sure they know how to share, treat others with respect."

What did she learn from her Kips Bay experience? "I learned how to give the kids

Transforming Kips Bay for Years to Come

The biggest and most dramatic renovation initiative in the history of the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club is about to begin. What advantages will this ambitious renovation bring to our growing population?

Our priority is to make the physical space much more effectively designed to host our educational and opportunity-driven programming. At the same time, our renovations will create a safer and more structured environment, one uniquely equipped to meet the needs of our growing number of members — and of the greater community as well.

“As the community’s needs change, our physical space must change, too,” says Daniel Quintero, Executive Director. “We need to continue to invest in our physical structures in order to meet the needs of our community, in particular our younger members.”

Most dramatically, we will enhance and beautify our game room, creating a mecca for that young audience and provide a wider range of the facility’s supportive offerings. That space, the centerpiece of the building, will be modernized and reconfigured with skylights making the space more inviting for all, with natural light.

We will also upgrade and enhance our computer lab, a critical resource for members of all ages, and enlarge our teen center to better serve that population’s specific programming needs. With this renovation, we can more effectively assist young adults with essential services, including career awareness, college readiness, and digital arts.

At the same time, we will retrofit other areas that our members’ evolving needs have outgrown: our dome, portable program spaces and program rooms will be reconfigured to create inviting spaces for events and programming, a thoughtfully planned investment in community spaces that will return value now and long into the future.

Construction starts in early 2023 and is expected to be completed by calendar year end. Current needs will be met throughout the renovation by careful planning that reroutes activities into areas that remain open, including our back wing, pool, gym, and ice rink.

And because the future sustainability of our community is a priority as well, our new and improved physical space is designed to be more eco-friendly: Kips Bay will be significantly enhanced, lowering costs and decreasing our footprint; a big improvement for the environment.

We need to continue to invest in our physical structures in order to meet the needs of our community, in particular our younger members.
