





# ACOMMON CAUSE &

Imagine a world without instant access to information. No Google. No Wi-Fi. No easily available devices and services to complete homework or research a school project. For many New York City students, this is their daily reality.

Recognizing this digital divide, T-Mobile launched Project 10 Million in 2020, a bold initiative aimed at connecting 10 million eligible K-12 students across the country with free internet, mobile hotspots, and access to low-cost devices. So far, the program has provided more than \$6 billion in products and services, connecting six million students.

In September 2024, this commitment was on full display at Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club Lucile Palmaro Clubhouse, where more than 200 kids gathered for an exciting announcement. T-Mobile's Vice President of Social Impact and Sustainability, Brigitta Witt, took the stage and shared that each child's household would be gifted 200GB of free internet—approximately 650 hours of connectivity. The room erupted in cheers, but the surprises didn't stop there. To help spread the message, T-Mobile enlisted Grammy-winning artist, actor, and activist, Common.

As Common entered the gym, the energy was electric. The teenage dance group K-Company welcomed him with a choreographed routine to his song, "Imagine," setting the stage for an unforgettable visit.

"How many of you know that you're valued?" he asked the crowd. When not every hand went up, he leaned in. "Wi-Fi is something that we all use. We all need access to information, to do our work, to connect. And when I ask if you know you're valued, it's because you deserve access."

According to a NYC Council report, nearly 25% of households in the city lack a high-speed internet subscription. In some community districts—many in the Bronx—that number leaps to 40%. The digital divide isn't just an inconvenience. It's a concrete barrier to education and opportunity.

But beyond access, Common delivered something equally important: inspiration. He wowed the crowd with an impromptu freestyle, feeding off the energy of the kids as they stomped and cheered along. He also took time to stress the importance of good role models, sharing how his mother, an educator, played a pivotal role in shaping his life.

The Kips Bay team works tirelessly to identify and forge relationships like the one with Project 10 Million. These corporate engagements provide unprecedented opportunities for our young members—in this case, critical access that connects, educates, and empowers.





# OUR KIPS BAY STATE YOUTH OF THE YEAR

For Kenya Davis, dance isn't just movement. It's a lifeline and language, her unique way of releasing what words can't say. And just like the moment before stepping onto the stage, her journey began in uncertainty, then transformed into resilience and, ultimately, triumph.

Kenya Davis embodies the spirit of resilience, leadership, and passion that defines the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club. Born in Antigua and raised in the Bronx's Castle Hill neighborhood, Kenya grew up surrounded by violence, substance abuse, and loss. But she found solace at Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club, becoming a member at seven years old. It became her village, teaching her social skills, keeping her off the streets, and providing a sense of stability when her heart ached the most.

# Her gratitude for Kips Bay deepened after an unimaginable loss.

On September 29, 2022, Kenya's oldest brother died by suicide. In those darkest moments, Kenya leaned into Kips Bay more than ever, pouring herself into dance with the Castle Hill Evolution team. That's when what had once been a pastime became her lifeline. Every movement provided some temporary relief from the weight of her loss. And she just kept dancing.

# Finding her rhythm as a mentor and leader.

The younger dancers who joined the team often came from similar backgrounds—each with their own struggles. Over time, Kenya realized she wasn't just healing herself. By sharing her knowledge and skills, she was helping them heal, too. She became a mentor, a source of hope for those looking for guidance, the kind of support she'd once needed. She saw the reflection of her younger self in their eyes—the same need for inspiration, the same desire for belonging. And this is where Kenya truly shined, stepping up as the ultimate role model.

# Kenya's journey at Kips Bay was a total transformation.

Programs like Smart Girls taught her self-worth. Brent's Club provided support and education in the wake of her family's battles with addiction. Today, she's an employee at Kips Bay, managing three different dance teams. She has also found her voice, showcasing her public speaking skills in city-wide competitions. "My experiences have taught me that no matter our background or circumstances, we all have the power to overcome adversity and make a difference in the lives of others," Kenya says. "By embracing our role as leaders, we can create a future where every individual is empowered to reach their full potential."

# THE STORY OF ENGEL SILVESTRI

In 2015, an 11-year-old boy walked into the Coudert Clubhouse at the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club for the first time. He had only been in the country for a few years. He spoke no English. Yet his excitement was undeniable. His smile stretched ear to ear as he took in his new surroundings.

Staff members welcomed him, gave him a tour, and quickly noticed something special. When Engel picked up a baseball glove, there was a spark. Even at 11, his arm was electric—throwing pitches with a speed and precision well beyond his years.

He was invited to join the baseball team and soon, Engel became more than just a player. He was an everyday presence at the Coudert Clubhouse—doing homework, playing billiards, and showing up for every practice. He pitched the Kips Bay team to multiple championships, anchored first base, and proved time and again that he was destined for something great.

### Then COVID hit.

Engel's journey took a curve. He and his family moved to the Dominican Republic and, for a while, we lost touch. Until we got the news. Engel Silvestri had been signed by the Colorado Rockies. The kid with the big smile and the golden arm had made it to the majors.

Last year, Engel walked back through our doors not as a member, but as an alumnus. He celebrated with us, wearing a custom Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club jersey, and the grown-up Engel toured the place that had been his second home.

# Dreams don't start in stadiums. They start in places like Kips Bay.

Engel's journey from the Bronx to the big leagues is proof that the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club is more than just an after-school program. It's a place where kids discover their potential, where dreams take shape, and where a single opportunity—like joining a baseball team—can change a life forever.

Brandon Stores, Jr. wasn't always a basketball superstar. In fact, when he first started playing the game at Kips Bay, Brandon was just a regular kid attending summer camp at the Kips Bay Throggs Neck Community Center. He wasn't the tallest, the fastest, or the most skilled. In fact, during one of his very first basketball practices, Brandon got laughed at by other kids. The coach made them run laps, reminding them they were once beginners, too. But what stood out that day wasn't the coach's discipline. It was Brandon's response.

He didn't cry. He didn't complain. He didn't even flinch. He just said, "I'm going to get better."

Brandon's father, a longtime Kips Bay member himself, saw it happening. He watched his son not only fall in love with the game, but with the grind. By the time he left St. Raymond High School for Boys, Brandon had become its all-time leading scorer. After leading his team to the

2024 CHSAA Archdiocesan Championship, Brandon considered Division I offers from Rutgers, George Mason, Syracuse, Washington and Xavier, ultimately choosing Georgia Tech.

But what makes Brandon special isn't just what he does on the court. It's who he is when he isn't dribbling or shooting threes. He returns to his old neighborhood every year to host back-to-school drives. He talks to kids from the same blocks he grew up on, letting them know that someone just like them made it—and that they can, too. "He's just an all-around good kid," says his dad.

Brandon's story is proof that greatness doesn't start with a trophy. It starts with a safe place to grow, people who believe in you, and the courage to keep working.

He may be chasing the NBA. But no matter how far Brandon goes, his roots – and his heart – are forever at Kips Bay.



# KIPS BAY HOCKEY PLAYERS EXPERIENCE THE WORLD BEYOND THE RINK

One of the most unique programs at Kips Bay is the hockey program, made possible by an exciting partnership with the New York Rangers. For a remarkably affordable price, Club members are issued full ice hockey gear, and receive expert lessons, including top-tier drills from the Junior Ranger staff. This collaboration has been a game-changer for many of the kids in the Bronx, providing them with not only the skills they need to succeed in the sport but also a sense of belonging and achievement.

One of the most enriching experiences for the Kips Bay hockey team came last year when the Rangers offered an incredible opportunity—a trip to Saskatchewan, Canada, to visit the Big River First Nation. The Club selected a group of eight members, accompanied by their parents, for the full-ride journey to this remote Native American community.

Over the course of four days, the Kips Bay team participated in a wide array of activities, including fishing, playing ice hockey, and camping. It was eye-opening for members to immerse themselves in a different culture, learning about the traditions and perspectives of the Big River community.

For the Kips Bay parents, the memories of this trip remain vivid, with many of them still talking about the powerful experience they shared with their children.

The trip was so intensely rewarding, we wanted to return the favor. So, the Big River First Nation's youth will be visiting Kips Bay. Through this exchange, both the Kips Bay and Big River communities are sharing much more than just a love of hockey. They're sharing a deeper understanding of each other's worlds and stories.

GIVING OUR KIDS A PICTURE-PERFECT OPPORTUNITY.



There's something powerful about seeing yourself through a new lens, both literally and figuratively. When we step outside our usual perspective, we begin to discover potential we didn't know was there. For the 12 participants in SONYC's photography program, "Focus & Frame," that new lens was the camera.

For seven weeks, members learned the craft of photography, from capturing candid moments around their Clubhouse to experimenting with nature shots outdoors. With cameras in hand, they didn't only discover the technical aspects of the art form, but also a new way of seeing the world.

A real highlight of the program came during a trip to LeVue Studios in Manhattan, where the aspiring photographers had the chance to apply their newfound skills in a professional setting. In a professional studio, surrounded by lights and high-quality cameras, members saw their images raised to new levels of expertise. For many, what began as a hobby on their phones transformed into an eye-opening experience about the potential of photography as a career

The journey culminated in a gallery wall at the Kids Camera Club within the Clubhouse, where each participant's work was proudly displayed: blown-up images of their own creation. It was a tangible reminder of what can happen when we look at the world—and ourselves—through a new lens.











# 2024 FINANCIAL SUMMARY
